Dear Friends,

The St. Francis de Sales parish family extends our love and sympathy to you and your family. We are here to walk with you through this overwhelming time. As the Church embraces us in baptism and throughout life, it also supports and holds us in dying and death.

Your departed loved one is a gift from God who knew the Lord in faith, but now sees God face-to-face in Heaven. The Scriptures tells us that death separates us temporarily; one day you will be reunited in the dwelling place prepared by Jesus. This is our rock solid faith.

When a Catholic dies we celebrate a set of Funeral Rites which helps us in our grieving and loss. These prayers bring comfort and expresses our love. The Church's rituals profess deep faith, and leads us to pray for the one who died.

This booklet, along with the parish minister assisting you, will help you plan the Funeral Rites. There are some things set by Church and parish policy, but you will find parts of the ritual where your preferences are requested.

Again, please know we want to assist you through this time. And, after the funeral, we are here to help you in any way we can. Don't hesitate to call upon us. The death of a loved one is a sad time, filled with difficult emotions. But it is also a celebration of eternal life for those baptized into the death and resurrection of Christ.

FUNERALS are part of the worship life of the Church, and St. Francis de Sales Parish strives to make these rites truly prayerful and dignified experiences for all who join us. To this end we will provide the following:

- assistance in planning the services
- ministers for all the Funeral Rites
- music
- a worship program handout
- prayerful support

The Funeral Rites

The Funeral Rites of the Catholic Church have three parts:

- the **Vigil service** the evening before with either the body or ashes present.
- the **Liturgy** (Funeral Mass) with either the body or ashes* present.
- the **Burial** with the interment of the body or ashes.

Another option is a Memorial Mass or service with no remains present. These can take place shortly after the time of death or at some convenient time for the gathering of friends and family.

THE VIGIL

The Vigil is a time of communal prayer, ordinary taking place in the early evening (usually between 6:00pm and 7:00pm) the day before the Funeral Mass. The service coincides with the visitation, and customarily takes place at the funeral home. On occasion, a family may receive permission to conduct the visitation and service at the church. The visitation may also immediately precede the Funeral Liturgy in the church.

The Archbishop has asked that if there is to be a eulogy or if a family member or friends wishes to speak in remembrance of the departed, then these remarks are to be done at the Vigil.

There are two options for the Vigil:

- A **Vigil prayer service**, which includes Scripture, brief homily, intercessions, and a blessing.
- **Recitation of the Rosary**, which can be led by a family member of the deceased or parish minister.

THE FUNERAL LITURGY

When one of its members dies, the Church encourages the Funeral Rites be performed within the celebration of Mass, although it is not required. The Funeral Rites apart from Mass may be celebrated at church, funeral home, or gravesite.

* The ashes of the deceased may be brought into the church when celebrating the Funeral Rites. An urn containing the ashes will be placed on a table near the sanctuary before the Liturgy begins. The prayers of the Liturgy are adapted slightly, but the rituals remain the same.

It is important to note that the Catholic Church strongly recommends the proper disposition of the ashes of the deceased. The first choice would be to place the ashes in a columbarium – or place designated for the interment of ashes. The second choice would be to bury the ashes in a cemetery as we would the body of the deceased. Whatever is chosen, the ashes must be given respect and dignity, and not be placed anywhere that is not sacred.

Those planning the funeral are encouraged to invite family members or friends, if qualified, to undertake the following roles:

- **Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion** (1 to 4 in number, depending on size of funeral and whether the Eucharist will be distributed under both species or one).
- **Readers** (1, 2 or 3). Readers are needed for the 1st Reading, 2nd Reading, and for the Prayers of the Faithful (Petitions).
- **Servers** (up to 3). Servers from the parish will be provided if none are available.
- **Gift Bearers** (up to 4)
- **Ushers** (up to 2). They may hand out worship programs as people come into the church.

Placing of the Pall

After the body is blessed with holy water at the beginning of the Liturgy, family members or friends may assist in the placing of the pall over the casket. The pall, which is a large white cloth, symbolizes the garment of baptism and the dignity of the Christian person.

Music

Music is an important part of our ritual. It helps us express our deep faith and comforts us. We encourage families to make full use of the Church's rich tradition and the parish's musical resources. To ensure the quality and sacred nature of the Funeral Liturgy, we recommend that musicians be assigned from those already trained within St. Francis de Sales parish. If outside musicians are selected, the parish Music Director may still need to be present to ensure the proper

functioning of our sound system and to oversee the flow of the Liturgy.

1 OT-1

Those who pleased God were loved; they who lived among sinners were transported—snatched away, lest wickedness pervert their mind or deceit beguile their soul; for the witchery of paltry things obscures what is right and the whirl of desire transforms the innocent mind. Having become perfect in a short while, they reached the fullness of a long career; for their souls were pleasing to the Lord, therefore he sped them out of the midst of wickedness. But the people saw and did not understand, nor did they take this into account.

1 OT-4

Isaiah 25:6a,7-9

The Lord God will destroy death forever

On this mountain the Lord of hosts will provide for all peoples. On this mountain he will destroy the veil that veils all peoples, the web that is woven over all nations; he will destroy death forever.

4 The Lord God will wipe away the tears from all faces; the reproach of his people he will remove from the whole earth; for the Lord has spoken. On that day it will be said: "Behold our God, to whom we looked to save us! This is the Lord for whom we looked; let us rejoice and be glad that he has saved us!"

1 OT-5

Lamentations 3:17-25

It is good to wait in silence for the Lord God to save

My soul is deprived of peace, I have forgotten what happiness is; I tell myself my future is lost, all that I hoped for from the Lord. The thought of my homeless poverty is wormwood and gall; remembering it over and over leaves my soul downcast within me. But I will call this to mind, as my reason to have hope: The favors of the Lord are not exhausted, his mercies are not spent; they are renewed each morning, so great is his faithfulness. My portion is the Lord, says my soul; therefore will I hope in him. Good is the Lord to one who waits for him, to the soul that seeks him; It is good to hope in silence for the saving help of the Lord.

1 OT-6

Maccabees 12:43-46

It is a good and holy thing to think of the dead rising

Judas, the ruler of Israel, took up a collection among all his soldiers, amounting to two thousand silver drachmas, which he sent to Jerusalem to provide for an expiatory sacrifice. In doing this he acted in a very excellent and noble way, inasmuch as he had the resurrection of the dead in view; for if he were not expecting the fallen to rise again, it would have been useless and foolish to pray for them in death. But if he did this with a view to the splendid reward that awaits those who had gone to rest in godliness, it was a holy and pious thought. Thus he made atonement for the dead that they might be freed from this sin.

Ecclesiastes 3:1-8
There is a time for everything

There is an appointed time for everything, and a time for every thing under the heavens. A time to be born, and a time to die; a time to plant, and a time to uproot the plant. A time to kill, and a time to heal; a time to tear down, and a time to build. A time to weep, and a time to laugh; a time to mourn, and a time to dance. A time to scatter stones, and a time to gather them; a time to embrace, and a time to be far from embraces. A time to seek, and a time to lose; a time to keep, and a time to cast away. A time to rend, and a time to sew; a time to be silent, and a time to speak. A time to love, and a time to hate; a time of war, and a time of peace.

1 NT-1

Jesus is judge of the living and the dead

Peter proceeded to speak, saying: "In truth, I see that God shows no partiality. Rather, in every nation whoever fears him and acts uprightly is acceptable to him. You know the word that he sent to the children of Israel as he proclaimed peace through Jesus Christ, who is Lord of all. He commissioned us to preach to the people and testify that he is the one appointed by God as judge of the living and the dead. To him all the prophets bear witness, that everyone who believes in him will receive forgiveness of sins through his name."

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SECOND READING

2 NT-1

We too might live in newness of life

Brothers and sisters: Are you unaware that we who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? We were indeed buried with him through baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might live in newness of life. If, then, we have died with Christ, we believe that we shall also live with him. We know that Christ, raised from the dead, dies no more; death no longer has power over him.

2 NT-2

Romans 8:31b-35,37-39
Nothing can separate us from God's love

Brothers and sisters: If God is for us, who can be against us? He who did not spare his own Son but handed him over for us all, will he not also give us everything else along with him? Who will bring a charge against God's chosen ones? It is God who

acquits us. Who will condemn? It is Christ Jesus who died, rather, was raised, who also is at the right hand of God, who indeed intercedes for us. What will separate us from the love of Christ? Will anguish, or distress or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or the sword? No, in all these things, we conquer overwhelmingly through him who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor present things, nor future things, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor any other creature will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

2 NT-3

I Cor 15:51-57

The dead will be raised incorruptible

Brothers and sisters: Behold, I tell you a mystery. We shall not all fall asleep, but we will all be changed, in an instant, in the blink of an eye, at the last trumpet. For the trumpet will sound, the dead will be raised incorruptible, and we shall be changed. For that which is corruptible must clothe itself with incorruptibility, and that which is mortal must clothe itself with immortality. And when this which is corruptible clothes itself with incorruptibility and this which is mortal clothes itself with immortality, then the word that is written shall come about: Death is swallowed up in victory. Where, O death, is your victory? Where, O death, is your sting? The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law. But thanks be to God who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.

2 NT-4

Romans 14:7-9,10c-12

The dead will be raised incorruptible

Brothers and sisters: No one lives for oneself, and no one dies for oneself. For if we live, we live for the Lord, and if we die, we die for the Lord; so then, whether we live or die, we are the Lord's. For this is why Christ died and came to life, that he might be Lord of both the dead and the living. For we shall all stand before the judgment seat of God; for it is written: As I live, says the Lord, every knee shall bend before me, and every tongue shall give praise to God. So then each of us shall give an accounting of himself to God.

2 NT-5

II Timothy 4:6-8

I have kept the faith

Beloved: I am already being poured out like a libation, and the time of my departure is at hand. I have fought the good fight; I have finished the race; I have kept the faith. From now on the crown of righteousness awaits me, which the Lord, the just judge, will award to me on that day, and not only to me, but to all who have longed for his appearance.

2 NT-6

II Cor 4:14-5:1

We have a dwelling from God eternal in heaven

Brothers and sisters: Knowing that the One who raised the Lord Jesus will raise us also with Jesus and place us with you in his presence. Everything indeed is for you, so that the grace bestowed in abundance on more and more people may cause the thanksgiving to overflow for the glory of God. Therefore, we are not discouraged; rather, although our outer self is wasting away, our inner self is being renewed day by day. For this momentary light affliction is producing for us an eternal weight of glory beyond all comparison, as we look not to what is seen but to what is unseen; for what is seen is transitory, but what is unseen is eternal. For we know that if our earthly dwelling, a tent, should be destroyed, we have a building from God, a dwelling not made with hands, eternal in heaven.

2 NT-7

II Cor 5:1,6-10

We walk by faith, not by sight

Brothers and sisters: We know that if our earthly dwelling, a tent, should be destroyed, we have a building from God, a dwelling not made with hands, eternal in heaven. We are always courageous, although we know that while we are at home in the body we are away from the Lord, for we walk by faith, not by sight. Yet we are courageous, and we would rather leave the body and go home to the Lord. Therefore, we aspire to please

him, whether we are at home or away. For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ, so that each may receive recompense, according to what he did in the body, whether good or evil.

2 NT-8

I Thessalonians 4:13-18
We shall always be with the Lord

We do not want you to be unaware, brothers and sisters, about those who have fallen asleep, so that you may not grieve like the rest, who have no hope. For if we believe that Jesus died and rose, so too will God, through Jesus, bring with him those who have fallen asleep. Indeed, we tell you this, on the word of the Lord, that we who are alive, who are left until the coming of the Lord, will surely not precede those who have fallen asleep. For the Lord himself, with a word of command, with the voice of an archangel and with the trumpet of God, will come down from heaven, and the dead in Christ will rise first. Then we who are alive, who are left, will be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air. Thus we shall always be with the Lord. Therefore, console one another with these words.

2 NT-9

I John 3:1-2
We shall be like Him

Beloved: See what love the Father has bestowed on us that we may be called the children of God. Yet so we are. The reason the world does not know us is that it did not know him. Beloved, we are God's children now; what we shall be has not yet been revealed. We do know that when it is revealed we shall be like him, for we shall see him as he is.

2 NT-10

Revelation 21:1-5a,6b-7

Homily

Father Bill asks that you compose thoughtful, personal information about your loved one to help him as he prepares the homily. He requests a family member provide him with three paragraphs about the departed:

- 1) Write about his/her faith in God.
- 2) Tell about his/her love of family.
- 3) Share whatever you wish about your loved one, perhaps something the congregation doesn't know.

Prayers of the Faithful

The pastoral associate or the priest assisting you will help compose petitions, with a special focus on personalizing them.

THE BURIAL

At the conclusion of the Liturgy, the body is taken to the gravesite where a brief service will be held before the remains are buried or interred.

Meal

We offer the family and friends of St. Francis de Sales parishioners a meal following the Funeral. A parish committee will provide the food and drink, and the meal will take place in Robert Martz Hall.

Non-parishioners who celebrated the funeral of a loved one at St. Francis de Sales may use the hall, but will need to have the meal catered from an outside provider.

Bereavement

The death of a loved one is very painful, and the loss can affect everything — your faith, your personality, your life. If you find you're not coping

well, please contact us and we will do everything we can to help. We wish to support you as you heal.

Prayer

It is an ancient Christian tradition to offer Masses for the repose of the soul of your loved one. At every Mass, though, in the Eucharistic Prayer, the priest and congregation prayerfully remember the departed, and we ask our merciful God to grant them a place in Heaven with all the saints.

November 2nd is All Souls Day, and the Mass that day is offered for all the departed. In fact, during the entire month of November, we have special remembrances and prayers for the deceased.
